GINN SPARKLES

Stewart Ginn won the Malaysian Open golf title for the second time to carve a narrow one-stroke victory over countryman Brian Jones in the 1986 Malaysian Open golf championship at The Royal Selangor Golf Club (RSGC) on Mar 9. He posted a final round one-under par 70 for a four round total of 276, *The Star* reported.

Jones, the 1978 champion, came in with a 71 after earlier rounds of 68, 71 and 67.

SUDDEN DEATH DRAMA AT RSGC IN 1994
Swede Joakim Haeggman emerged champion at the Benson & Hedges Malaysian Open Golf Championship on March 20, 1994.

At RSGC, the 24-year-old Haeggman, a Ryder Cup player, shot a three-under 69 for a four-day total of 279.

New Zealand's Frank Nobilo and Malaysia's P Gunasegaran returned a 68 and 70 to force a sudden death play-off, the second time since the tournament's inception in 1962, reported *The Star*.
